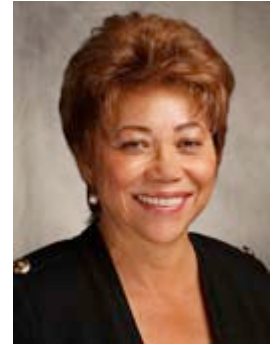
GRESHAM BULLOCK, ALICE

MCDUGALL, HAROLD

MTIMA, LATEEF

During the Fall semester while serving as the Distinguished Libra Scholar in Residence at the University of Maine School of Law, Professor Mtima was an invited panelist at the “D is for Digitize” Symposium on intellectual property rights in the digital information age, organized and presented by New York Law School on October 8-9, 2009. He also was also invited to be a Presenter at “The Fourth International Conference on Legal, Security and Privacy Issues in Intellectual Property Law” in Malta on November 3-5, 2009 where his paper, *When First We Practice to Deceive: Arresting Online Copyright Infringement Through the Digital Millennium Copyright Act* was awarded the prize for Best Academic Paper of 2009.

Professor Mtima also organized and moderated the CLE program “Intellectual Property: Legal Issues and Social Justice Impact in the Information Age” conducted at the University of Maine School of Law on November 12, 2009. Also, during the Fall semester, Professor Mtima began serving his term as the first African American President of the Giles S. Rich American Inn of Court for the Federal Circuit, the nation’s oldest intellectual property Inn, and presided over the Inn programs “An Evening with Vivek Kundra, Chief Information Officer of the United States”, on September 23; “Intellectual Property in a Foreign Country”, on October 14; and “The Pros and Cons of Trade Secret vs. Patents”, on November 17, 2009.

On January 20, 2010, Professor Mtima co-hosted the IP on-line workshop “The Google Book Search Project in Perspective”, presented by the Center for Intellectual Property at the University of Maine. On January 27, 2010, he attended the “Internet Privacy 2010 Colloquium” presented by Dialogue on Diversity; and on January 28, 2010, he participated in the Colloquium on Innovative Policy roundtable program “Discursive Disorder: Power, Authority and Politics in Indigenous Intellectual Property” hosted by the New York University School of Law.

On February 17, 2010, Professor Mtima co-hosted a second IP on-line workshop for the CIT, “The Social Justice Implications of the Google Settlement” and on February 18, 2010, Professor Mtima gave testimony before the United States District Court for the Southern District of New York at the Final Fairness Hearing on the Google Books Settlement, on behalf of the Law School’s Institute for Intellectual Property and Social Justice. The Institute is the only Civil Rights organization permitted to offer testimony and the only African American organization present at the proceedings.

On February 25, Professor Mtima participated in the BNA Advisory Board program “Will the Veil of Secrecy Be Lifted in the ACTA Talks?” and he also presided over the Rich Inn programs “IP Arbitration and Alternative Dispute Resolution”, and “A Dialogue with USPTO Director Kappos”, on January 13, 2010 and February 16, 2010.

Over the past year, Professor Mtima has been interviewed by a variety of media journalists in connection with the Google Book Project, and excerpts and quotes from which can be found in the New York Times, Law 360, the Patent, Copyright, and Trademark Journal, and other publications.

***ROSS, JOSEPHINE***

Judge Chambers of the Supreme Court of Washington cited Professor Josephine Ross’ Crawford's *Short-lived Revolution: How Davis v. Washington Reins in Crawford's Reach*, 83 N.D. L.Rev. 387, 402 (2007) in his concurring opinion in *State v. Pugh*, 167 Wash.2d 825 (2009). The case involved the breadth of the excited utterance exception and whether it conflicted with the state and federal right to confront witnesses in a criminal trial.

Professor Ross is heading down to New Orleans for Spring Break with students again this year.

TASLITZ, ANDREW

Professor Andrew E. Taslitz just published the first volume of his co-authored two-volume criminal procedure treatise, 1 **Mastering Criminal Procedure: Investigation** (2010). He also had his piece, *Prosecuting Informants*, accepted by the **Michigan Law Review** and has been invited to speak at a symposium on mass incarceration at Harvard Law School on October 15, 2011.

Professor Taslitz attended a three-days-long final committee meeting of the Uniform Law Commission's Committee on Drafting a Uniform Statute on Videotaping Custodial Interrogations. The final statute will be voted on by the full Commission this coming August 2011.

Professor Taslitz also just published *Fourth Amendment Federalism: The Political Silencing of the American Poor* in the **Chicago-Kent Law Review**.
